#### Conclusions from Data:

Overall, students at Westlake experience a safe and orderly learning environment. The areas for improvement identified by review of our school referral data continue to be in the areas of physical contact and aggression.

### Conclusions from Parent, Teacher and Student Input:

Fifth grade student survey data from the 2013 California Healthy Kids Survey indicates that over half of all students feel safe at school all of the time. When all and most percentages are combined, 88% of students feel safe at school. Data also indicates that 96% of students feel there is a caring adult at school that knows them well. Additionally, 97% of students feel connected to the school. Student data indicates there is area for growth in the area of problem solving skills for students at school. Teacher data indicates there is area for growth in how students follow rules of conduct.

List Data Sources Reviewed and How the Data Determined the Goals: surveys, focus groups, discipline, and attendance.

**Suspension records:** Suspensions continue to stay at low levels since 2011-12. Three students in the 2014-15 school year were suspended for physical injury to staff members.

Behavior referrals: Results indicate an increase in office referrals. This can partially be attributed to a change in the referral reporting process. Minor physical contact and aggression are the two most common referrals issued and recorded. In 2010-11 there were 103 behavior referrals logged in Infinite Campus. There were 10 event types and 39 students involved. The most common referral issued was for "Unsafe Behavior." These behaviors were primarily playground related and involved a conflict between two or more students. The second most common referral issued was for classroom misconduct. In the 2011-12 school year, 41 referrals were recorded in 6 different event categories to 22 students. Of those, 24/41 were for unsafe behavior. A more detailed analysis of the referrals received indicated individual students had isolated incidents of physical altercations resulting from a disagreement. In the 2012-13 school year, 54 office referrals were recorded in 11 different categories involving 27 students and 16 staff. Of those, 15 were for unsafe behavior, 12 for inappropriate language, 8 for casual cruelty, and 6 for class misconduct. In the 2013-14 school year, 53 office referrals were received.

In the 2014-15 school year, as of February 12, 2015, 74 office referrals have been received. Of those 57 were for physical aggression of some kind. The distribution of students shows that 4 students received 50/74 referrals. There have been 23 students that have received 1 or more office referrals in this school year. There is evidence of a disproportionate referral rate for students of color. Of the 74 referrals 47 were for white students and 27 were for Black and Latino students.
